Recent events

On the 30th April 2024, ECSFG Sixth Form received an assembly from the Met Police who discussed the topic of malicious communication which is when someone sends a letter or any other form of communication that is indecent, grossly offensive, threatening, or contains information which is false or believed to be false. The purpose for sending it is to cause distress or anxiety to the person it is sent to. A form of malicious communication that the Met Police discussed was Cyber bullying. Cyber bullying involves the use of electronic communication to harass, intimidate, or harm others. Cyber bullying can take various forms such as impersonation (creating fake accounts to deceive or humiliate someone), exclusion (intentionally leaving someone out of online groups or activities), spread of rumours (sharing false or damaging information about someone), and online trolling (posting inflammatory or offensive comments to provoke or upset others). The Met Police encourage students to set all social media platforms to private in order to create a safer and more secure online environment. It is important to promote positive and respectful online interactions to prevent cyber bullying.
