If your daughter is going to be absent from school you should do the following:

- Leave a message on the absence line **prior to 8.30am** otherwise you will receive a text message saying your daughter has not registered
- State clearly your daughter's name and year group and a brief reason for absence
- You must call the absence line every day of absence unless you have provided the school with a Fit Note from your daughter's GP

We would be grateful if you:

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- do not leave any other message on the absence phone line
- do not phone the main switchboard to check we have received your absence message
- do not phone the main switchboard to tell us your daughter is going to be late

Instead please email ecsgeneral@enfieldcs.enfield.sch.uk for the attention of your daughter's Progress and Achievement Leader who will then be notified of any other non-absence related information. Many thanks from the Attendance Team.

Attendance and Punctuality

I thank you for your contribution to ensuring that your daughter attends school every day as you are a major part of this success.

The vast majority of our students are also punctual to school. However, this is not quite where we would like it to be and, if your daughter struggles in this respect, I thank you for your continued efforts and support of our school in working to address any concerns.

Uniform and Presentation

Addressing uniform and related matters is something that takes up a lot of time when it is not correct and in line with our student dress code and we would much prefer this time to be spent on other positive aspects of school life.

Most parents choose ECSfG as a school of choice for their daughter due to combined factors of the way in which students present themselves, the quality of opportunity and learning and the strong academic outcomes achieved.

As Headteacher I am very proud of our school and the continued work of my colleagues in maintaining these high standards for our school community.

This half term we have been focusing on ensuring that every student is adhering to our school dress code. I thank you and my colleagues here in school for the time spent on this matter with the improvements clear to see. However this work will continue after the Easter break.

It is important that your daughter is aware of this and adheres to our expectations without arguing the matter or claiming to have not been aware of what has been clarified to every student on numerous occasions.

Within our school community, students, parents and staff have differing views regarding the matter of school uniform and its importance. However, as Headteacher I view it as intrinsically linked to the day to day routines, strengths and successes of our school and expect that students who attend our school adhere to this accordingly.

School uniform guidance is detailed at the foot of this letter for your easy reference.

We have families experiencing long term financial crisis impacting on the ability to purchase school uniform items.

If the reason that your daughter is not wearing the correct full school uniform or full PE kit is because of this, I would ask that you contact the school for support in this matter.

Mrs O'Brien, Deputy Headteacher can be contacted by telephone or through email to ecsgeneral@enfieldcs.enfield.sch.uk to make her aware and for us to facilitate support.

Please do not feel uncomfortable or embarrassed to do so - we would much rather support you in ensuring that your daughter is dressed correctly in full uniform than for her to not be.

Jewellery

Jewellery or accessories worn by a student other than that stated in our uniform policy is likely to be confiscated and returned at a later date that is convenient to the school, for example at the end of that school term.

If the item is confiscated we will of course endeavour not to mislay it, however in the busy daily life of the school I am not able to confirm that this would never happen.

It is important for parents/carers and their daughters to be aware that the school will accept no liability for loss of or damage to an item that is not part of school uniform policy (including loss/damage caused by criminal activity such as theft) while the item is on the school site. Therefore meaning that the item will not be replaced or the cost covered by the school.

This could of course be very upsetting for a family if this were to be the case and I ask that this information is reiterated by you to your daughter as it has been here in school having come into effect on Monday, 19 February 2024.

Blazers

Blazers need to be worn at all times and not carried. With the warmer weather just around the corner there is no need for heavy padded jackets with fur trimmed hoods to be worn which will eradicate the frequent and frustrating conversations with students regarding their blazer being in their hand or school bag when it must be worn!

Mobile Phones

A potential national strategy to ban mobile phones in schools has been a recent news item in relation to the detriment of young people's mental health and wellbeing in their access to and amount of time spent on social media.

We have a very clear school policy and practice of 'out of sight and out of sound' relating to mobile phones which is regularly communicated to students.

I thank you for your support in this matter and if you or your daughter are at all uncertain of our expectations and associated practice, I would ask that you or your daughter speak to Mrs O'Brien or her Progress and Achievement Leader.

I fully appreciate that many parents wish for their daughter to have a mobile phone with her in case of an emergency to and from school. However if that is the case I would ask that you also reiterate to her the safety aspect of using it when walking to and from school often accompanied with ear buds and being oblivious to traffic and the possibility of being mugged. We regularly speak to students about their personal safety and this will be best supported by a united and consistent school and home message.

I would also like to remind parents that if a student does bring a mobile phone into school, it is her responsibility to ensure that it is kept safe.

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During the course of the summer term I will be reviewing our current mobile phone policy with a view to potentially moving to 'no smart phone' on school premises guidance. If this is the direction that I decide for us to move to it will be in the best interests of our school community and students, and will be conveyed to all students, parents and carers clearly and in a timely manner.

Please do ensure consideration towards local residents who might require access to and from their homes by car during these times. Blocking local roads by careless or illegal parking creates friction between our school and residents and I would really appreciate your support in ensuring that this does not happen and that you are mindful of the safety of our students and other young or elderly persons using footpaths and crossing roads. Parking on verges, zig-zag yellow lines and across pavements is not acceptable.

With the days lengthening and the weather becoming milder it would be positive to see more students developing their independence and travelling to school by public transport and by foot where that is possible.

School Uniform Guidance

Thank you for supporting your daughter and our school by ensuring that our full school uniform policy is followed at all times. This is appreciated by us in school.

In order to ensure standards are maintained throughout the day, students should arrive at school in correct uniform (or **full correct** PE kit on key stage 3 PE day) and will be expected to leave school dressed in the same way.

May I remind parents/carers that school trousers must only be the school issue dark navy with the school badge for ALL current year 7-9 students and for students in years 10 and 11 when purchasing new school wear.

Kilts should be worn at a length that is acceptable for a school uniform with either black or navy knee length socks or tights. Leggings under the school kilt are not permitted.

All school blouses should have the revere open collar, however the shirt with the school badge on is optional. If a vest or undergarment is worn under the school blouse, it should not be visible above the neckline or extend beyond the sleeves.

Headscarves and coverings must be either plain black, dark navy or bottle green (to match the colours in the school kilt and of the school blazer and jumper). These should be worn on their own with nothing underneath and with no embroidery or beading of any kind.

Coats must be worn over blazers and blazers should not be carried. If your daughter has her coat on and is carrying her blazer, she will be expected to remove her coat and put her blazer on. Hoodies of any colour or type are not permitted to be worn either under the blazer or in place of a coat.

Please ensure that your daughter returns to school after the half term in full school uniform and a reminder that students are only allowed to wear one stud in each ear, no hoops or dangly earrings and no other items of jewellery (except one plain gold or silver small nose stud) are permitted. Students are not allowed acrylic nails, long natural nails or varnished nails.


